### Our Forest School Site

At Ilchester Community Primary School we are very fortunate to have a large, wild area that we are working to develop into a Forest School site. The site will have different zones for learning, all of which will be carefully planned to work with the environment, allowing nature to thrive. The site will consist of a wilding meadow area, a small woodland area for shelter building and an outdoor classroom area with a wooden cabin, furniture and a fire circle.



We are committed to providing our children with regular opportunities for outdoor learning. These opportunities will allow our children to learn, grow, and thrive in an outdoor environment that fosters curiosity, resilience, and a lifelong love of the natural world.

## Our Vision

To inspire learners through hands-on experiences in nature, promoting confidence, independence, and wellbeing.

### Why is outdoor learning so important to us?

When children learn outside, they develop problem-solving skills, resilience, and independence through real-world experiences that cannot be replicated in a classroom. Research shows that learning outdoors, amongst nature, encourages creativity and boosts mental and physical health for our children. We believe every child in our school deserves the chance to connect with nature, discover their capabilities, and grow through meaningful, joyful outdoor learning opportunities.

### Forest School Leaders

At Ilchester we have three members of staff with a **Level 3 Forest School Practitioners Award** who are qualified to oversee the development of the site, plan and run Forest School programmes and activities.



### **Miss Bush** – Year Two Class Teacher and Key Stage One Lead

Miss Bush is responsible for outdoor learning across the school and will be teaching Forest School activities with select groups of children as well as working with class teachers to ensure all children are accessing the Forest School site and taking part in structured outdoor learning opportunities on a regular basis. Miss Bush is also overseeing the development of the Forest School site.

**Mrs King** – Deputy Head Teacher, SENCO and DSL

Mrs King will be working alongside Miss Bush to develop the Forest School site and ensure accessibility for all children.

**Mrs Lambe** – Early Years Practitioner

Mrs Lambe will be working with our Pre-School staff to plan regular outdoor learning activities using the Forest School site

Forest School and Outdoor Learning happen in all weathers and in all seasons, so being dressed appropriately is essential for the children’s comfort and the school’s risk assessment.

It is important that the clothes the children wear will protect them from the weather and activities as well as guarding them against natural environment considerations such as insect bites and stinging nettles. Therefore, in all seasons, the children must wear long trousers.

Please ensure your child comes to school with a pair of wellies (recommended even when it is dry) or substantial shoes that may get muddy! Children will also need a waterproof coat. Sun hats and sunscreen are advised as we head into summer. If you are unable to provide any of these items for your child, please let your child’s class teacher know and we will be happy to provide them with spares.
